But after inspection it was clear to see that the problem was the inlet valve spring retaining key, it was no longer there. The good news was I had made a spare last year, after hearing other riders talk of the problem, it was in the van, so after 20 minutes, a repair and a coffee it was back on the road. I did not stop again, arrived at the sea front at 11.40 am, about the same as last year. I will have to do a bit of work before next year.
